


Coins for Change

Capturing the essence of African Safari




With its vast horizons punctured by acacia trees, big open grasslands teeming with wildlife and the vibrant culture of the Maasai people with their fiery red shukas, you are immediately immersed into this uniquely African wilderness.

Established in 1960 to protect the local wildlife from hunters, the Masai Mara's sweeping savannah is now home to over 95 wildlife species, including the 'Big 5' (Lion, Buffalo, Rhino, Leopard and Elephant), and over 400 bird species – but it is best known for its big cats, tree-climbing lions and the annual migration of over one and a half million wildebeest, usually from July through to November. Nowhere else provides you with such an abundance of game, in such an accessible and emotive setting.


The Mara's four distinct natural habitats: the

The Mara's four distinct natural habitats: the sandy Ngama Hills area favoured by black rhino, the lush river-fed Mara Triangle, the grasslands of the Central Plains, and the rocky verges of the Oloololo Escarpment all offer richly diverse game viewing opportunities.

As you float above the grasslands in a hot air balloon, watch a pride of lions laze in the midday sun from the seat of an open game vehicle or walk in the footprints of elephants or the elusive rhino on a game walk, you will see why the Masai Mara is known as the birthplace of the African safari – this is the essence of safari.

It is not only the wildlife that makes the Masai Mara so special, but the chance to engage with the rich culture of the local Maasai people. This ancient tribe of nomadic warriors have called the Mara 'home' for centuries and have become an important symbol of Kenyan culture. Meet with the Maasai in their village, watch a dramatic tribal dance or learn from an elder how they have fought to preserve their cultural heritage despite rapid modernisation.

Come and experience the profound silence of a pre-dawn Africa, watch the heat rising off the savannah; listen to the cry of a fish eagle, the scurry of a dung beetle, the deep-throated call of a male lion, or learn ancient wisdoms from a Maasai mother. **Come experience the authentic** home of the African safari.





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Stand and face the full force of nature


This UNESCO World Heritage site, known locally as 'Mosi-oa-Tunya' – the smoke that thunders, is the point at which Zimbabwe and Zambia's mighty Zambezi river is thrown over a two kilometre stretch of basalt cliff, falling 100 metres into a churning whirlpool before continuing its journey down a series of dramatic rapids and gorges.


Flanked by nature reserves, with a mist-fed rainforest on its opposite shore, a thunder-like roar that can be heard 40 kilometres away, and in the high-water season, a spray column that can reach heights of over 400 metres. The falls' energy is palpable and awe-inspiring, and it is no surprise that Victoria Falls has been named one of the seven natural wonders of the world.

While both Zimbabwe and Zambia offer magnificent views of the falls, each offer uniquely diverse ways of experiencing them, allowing us to craft a truly personal encounter for you. Immerse yourself in a serene canoe trip or sunset voyage on the Upper Zambezi with hippo, crocs and elephants as your river-side companions; let the falls be your backdrop as you take high-tea at the iconic Victoria Falls hotel; get a breathtaking bird's eye view of the falls from a helicopter or micro-light; or feel the ground thrumming beneath your feet and the spray against your face, as you hike the forest path on the Zimbabwean side, with its gorge-edge viewpoints and head-on view of the Main Falls.



For a deeper sense of adventure, you can experience the adrenaline-surging walk across Zambia's Knife-Edge Bridge which swings about 100 metres above the gorge; spend a heart-flipping morning rafting the Lower Zambezi's fierce white water; or feel the pull of the Zambezi as it flows towards the falls' edge as you swim to the rock edge of Devil's Pool: nature's own infinity pool. This rock pool sits at the very top of Victoria Falls – a natural rock barrier just before the edge of the falls allows you to lie and look over the edge right into the 103 metre chasm below.

No matter how or when you choose to experience Victoria Falls, you cannot help feeling humbled, in awe and rejuvenated by the unstoppable life-force of Africa's largest waterfall.


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Wine, waves, whales and wonder



The Cape mountains, alive with wildlife and fynbos, tumble down into sandy beaches, indigenous forests, vineyards, over cliffs into crashing oceans rich with marine life, and into a colourful city centre throbbing with art, wine, exotic cuisine, music and colourful peoples.

This intriguing province really has it all: vast mountain ranges clothed in the uniquely South African floral kingdom – fynbos; long stretches of sandy beaches; nature reserves protecting spectacular marine, floral and wildlife; world-class vineyards tucked into breathtaking valleys; incredible fine dining experiences paired with famous wines, whiskeys and craft beers. Cape Town's city life buzzes with art, bars, museums, markets filled with performers, crafts, organic food and local produce, and, of course, a colourful, moving history, all at the foot of the iconic Table Mountain.

Combining a luxurious city stay with a few sublime days on a white-washed beach on the Whale Coast, a stayover in the heart of the mountainous winelands in Franschhoek and taking in some dramatic wildlife along the way – in just one holiday – is not only possible in this diverse, and easily accessible, part of South Africa, it is magnificent. The Western Cape truly is an iconic African experience.

The province's capital Cape Town, also known as The Mother City, sits on the jagged point where the Indian and Atlantic oceans meet, setting the tone for a cosmopolitan, colourful melting pot of cultures, cuisine, nature and city life. Few other cities in the world offer such a unique combination of wild nature and sophisticated city experiences: where you can lose yourself hiking the forested slopes of Table Mountain, go shark diving, or swim with penguins at Boulder's beach; explore an 1800s Cape Dutch homestead and vineyard while sampling a glass of one of South Africa's famous wines over lunch; sail out to Robben Island - the site of Nelson Mandela's 27 year-long imprisonment – to experience a poignant and moving part of democracy's history; paraglide into the sunset off Signal Hill, and then watch as the moon rises over the city's glistening night lights from a roof top bar downtown.

A few days in Cape Town will leave you inspired, intrigued and with a deeper appreciation for what it means to be on the tip of Africa.



Cape Winelands

Venturing inland from Cape Town into the Cape Winelands – less than an hour out of Cape Town itself - is an epicurean must. Savour the region's renowned Pinotage seated in the heart of the terroir that creates it, all set against a backdrop of gabled Cape Dutch architecture and magnificent mountain ranges. The wineland towns of Stellenbosch and Franschhoek rival Cape Town's reputation as South Africa's gourmet capital with an array of inspiring and exotic restaurants running the gamut from casual cafes offering intriguing twists to international fare, to fine-dining experiences where local flavours are infused into culinary masterpieces - all paired with locally grown and crafted wines and whiskeys, and now beers and gins too. With so many of the Cape Winelands' best restaurants laying their tables on wine farms, amid picturesque vineyards, heritage gardens, centuries-old farmsteads, and with astonishing views of mountains jutting into the horizon: your Cape Winelands wining and dining is a veritable sensory feast.

While the Cape Winelands are certainly all about food, wine and beautiful scenery, that scenery is also home to some of South Africa's best hiking, rock climbing, mountain biking and even paragliding: the craggy mountain paths leading you through fynbos-rich landscapes with views across vineyards and valleys can be hair-raisingly (for the adrenaline junkie) stunning, and will certainly deepen your Western Cape experience.





Hermanus & Garden Route

Add to the magic of your Cape getaway by escaping further from Cape Town, to the Cape Whale Coast at Hermanus. This friendly seaside town, caught between mountains and beautiful ocean beaches, is famous for being the breeding ground for migratory southern right whales from June to November, and offers some of the best whale watching in the world. A boat trip will provide the best close-up whale encounters but you can also admire these ancient creatures fluking and sprouting from land in the sheltered waters of the bay, as you saunter along a rustic boardwalk, or past the town's galleries, shops and waterfront cafes.

Adventuring even further into the Western Cape towards the southernmost tip of Africa at Cape Agulhas, will reveal a varied and dramatic coastline, punctuated by tranquil beaches, dramatic mountain passes, the wide-open spaces of the Karoo with its quirky towns known for soulful retreats, hearty South African cuisine, colourful local characters, as well as many nature reserves and wilderness areas: rich with biodiversity. And stars. So many stars.

With an abundance of places to explore: the Western Cape will inspire your sense of adventure while soothing your body and soul.



Formed by the seasonal flooding and ebbing of the Okavango River – known locally as the 'river that never finds the sea' – as it flows from the Angolan Highlands, the Okavango Delta fans 170km out into the parched Kalahari Desert.



The Delta is a lush and intricate web of waterways, islands and hillocks, that during the dry season, provide refuge to over 160 mammal species and 530 bird species that migrate here from the heat and thirst of the surrounding desert. It is one of Africa's richest and most diverse concentrations of bird and wildlife, including the famous Big 5 and a variety of specially adapted animals, such as the rare swamp-dwelling sitatunga and red lechwe antelope. It is also home to one of the richest pack densities of endangered African Wild Dog and the extremely rare Pel's Fishing Owl, the world's only fish-eating owl: this is Africa's own Garden of Eden.

A safari in the Okavango Delta is a deeply personal experience. Not only does the diverse landscape and wildlife fluctuate in sympathy with the seasonal ebb and flow of the river making your experience unique, but you can truly tailor your trip: choosing from high-end permanent camps and lodges, to luxury mobile camps in remote (often island) settings, to a night under the stars in a star bed, all under the experienced watch of highly-trained and passionate local safari guides.




Game walks, game drives, boat trips or even a flip in a helicopter are all fantastic ways to see the Delta - especially for photographers as each gives you a very different perspective. However, it is the chance to explore the Delta in a traditional dug-out canoe called a mokoro, with a local oarsman (or Poler) at the helm that makes game viewing in this part of the world truly special. It is not only the sheer beauty of the landscape as you meander and wind your way through this maze of glistening waterways, or the abundance of unperturbed African wildlife that you will silently glide past, but the rare and spell-binding feeling that you are intimately part of this pristine and unique wilderness that will really captivate you.

Experience sublime beaches and tropical tranquility


With its stretch of pristine, seemingly undiscovered beaches, its tropical archipelagos strung together by endless turquoise waters, its melting pot of cultures and delicious cuisine, and its protected marine and wildlife reserves, Mozambique remains one of Africa's most idyllic – and wildest – secrets.


Although recognised as a bio-diversity hotspot, Mozambique is still relatively undiscovered and often yours are the only splashes in the waves or footprints in the sand. The coral reefs and secluded islands scattered along Mozambique's Indian Ocean coastline form the largest marine protection area in Africa, offering refuge to diverse shoals of incandescent fish, as well as whale sharks, sea turtles, manta rays and the elusive dugong.


You can explore it all from the bow of a traditional Dhow as you sail from island to island on a sunset cruise or marine safari; immerse yourself in the silence and colour of underwater habitats as you snorkel, sea kayak or dive above coral reefs, with dolphins and whale sharks; go deep-sea fishing (Benguerra Island offers some of the world's best catch-and-release deep sea and fly-fishing opportunities); horseback riding; or just watch the sun sinking and moon rising before enjoying a secluded castaway beach picnic under a sky littered with stars.



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Experience the challenge and privilege of a primate safari

Only around 1000 mountain gorillas still survive, with almost all of them living within three heavily protected national parks: Bwindi Impenetrable Forest and Mgahinga Gorilla National Park in Uganda, and on the slopes of the dormant volcanic Virunga mountain range in Rwanda's Volcanoes National Park.

Only a very restricted number of permits are granted for each park every year to protect not only the gorillas, but their fragile natural habitat too – a habitat that is home to the chimpanzee and a number of other endangered primate species, such as the golden and L'hoest monkeys.

As each country has made eco-tourism central to their economies, it deepens your experience.


As each country has made eco-tourism central to their economies, it deepens your experience knowing that your gorilla trek is contributing directly to the protection and conservation of these gentle, mysterious primates and their natural, wild habitats.

As does adding on a visit to a community-led initiative, such as Children in the Wilderness, to see, first-hand, how conservation programmes at local schools are making a real difference; or walk the Batwa Trail with an elder of the forest-dwelling Batwa people as he explains the medicinal uses of the plants.

Finding and getting to the gorillas is an adventurous challenge in itself - the parks are only accessible by foot, through challenging, unmarked terrain, along paths that your guide is often creating with a machete as you walk.






The Kruger's vast extent gives rise to a diversity of natural habitats and eco-systems, making it one of the best places to spot Africa's famous 'Big 5', and is the ideal reserve for first-time – and seasoned – safari goers. The Kruger is home to over 1800 lion, 1000 leopard, 13750 elephant, 37000 African buffalo and some of the largest numbers of the critically endangered black rhino. It also gives refuge to more elusive animals like wild dogs, cheetah, sable and roan antelope, as well as vast herds of impala, giraffe and the striking zebra.

The Kruger's abundance of big game is matched by a plethora of reptiles, insects and over 500 species of bird, and of course, the more difficult to spot 'little five': the ant lion, leopard tortoise, elephant shrew, buffalo weaver and rhino beetle.









African coastline has a life-force and stark beauty that is tangible and inescapable.

> Captured by the huge, ever-changing sand dunes that 'walk' and shift with the wind; the eerie hug of the almost daily, grey fog as it delivers moisture from the sea to the parched sand; a brilliant canopy of stars; the resilient beauty of the local desert tribespeople, and the ingenious desert-adapted wildlife and flora that, amazingly, live and thrive here – this is a safari destination like no other.

Christened for the morbid, yet striking, collection of shipwrecks and sun-bleached southern right whale bones littering this treacherous swathe of beach, the Skeleton Coast stretches over a vast 500 kilometres from the intriguing coastal town of Swakopmund to the Angolan border, via a varied landscape of lengthy beaches, searinglyorange sand dunes, rocky valleys, sandy outcrops and oasis-like springs. This ever-changing desert landscape is home to some of the rarest and most ingenious flora and fauna Africa has to offer. The life-giving fog that forms where the desert meets the sea, carries an essential moisture-source inland: sustaining a unique eco-system of desertadapted animals and plants, such as elephant, lion, the critically endangered black rhino and ancient welwitschia plants, as well as other rare African animals such as the black-faced impala. gemsbok, giraffe and brown hyena.







The Skeleton Coast is an adventure traveller's dream: climb soaring sand dunes to take in incredible views and sandboard or 4x4 down them again; photograph historic shipwrecks; hot air balloon over lunar-like landscapes, engage with the local Himba people in nomadic villages; visit an enormous Cape fur seal colony; go on a game drive in search of the Namib's famed desert-adapted lions or take a fly-in safari to the wildly remote Skeleton Coast National Park - with only 800 visitors a year, yours and the elephants' footprints really are the only marks on the sand. Spend a night on a 'star-safari': the desert's dry, clear, dark nights are the perfect environment for sleeping in a star-bed under the mesmerising canopy. Namibia's Skeleton Coast is a love song to nature's resilience in an indescribably beautiful land of colour, contrasts and adventure.

The Great Migration is the extraordinary annual journey of nearly two million wildebeest (accompanied by almost a million zebra, gazelle and other antelope, all watched over by a surreptitious mass of predators), as they chase the rains across two vast African countries and 2000 kilometres of wilderness, in search of better grazing.


While the epic scale of the Great Migration will certainly take your breath away, being exposed to such a primal race for life, to nature at her most raw, most basic, will leave you breathless. There are two common misconceptions about the Great Migration: one that it is a single event, and the other is that it is just a frenzied stampede of individual antelope bolting for the best graze. In truth, the migration syncs with the rainy seasons over a 12-month period, and the herd operate as one cohesive group using 'swarm intelligence' to overcome the main obstacles blocking them from greener pastures.

Each part of this year-long journey offers you unique often astounding wildlife spectacles.

Each part of this year-long journey offers you unique, often astounding, wildlife spectacles. Watch as wildebeest birth and nurture their young on the southern Serengeti's lush Ndutu plains from January to March – about 8000 calves are born a day under the hungry eye of the largest concentration of predators on earth: lion (over 3000 of them), leopard, cheetah and crocodiles at what seems to be an all-you-can-eat antelope buffet.



Witness massed herds funnel their way up into the central and western Serengeti in huge 40 kilometre columns from April to June; or see the adrenaline-fuelled leaps of faith of thousands of wildebeest as they launch into crocodile-infested rivers from July-October. It is at these rivers that you can best see 'swarm intelligence' in action, and also why the Mara and Grumeti River crossings are named one of the seven wonders of nature. The herd gather at the river's edge, stamping and hesitating, waiting for a silent signal to leap, not 'each wildebeest for himself' but in a joint crescendo of adrenaline and instinct, into the river to continue their year-long migration.



Not only do you see so much more on foot - birds, bugs, burrows, wild flowers and medicinal plants as you quietly tread in the footsteps of Africa's greats: elephant, hippo and lion, but you are forced to slow right down and just be present. Moving at Africa's pace allows your senses to awaken and tune into every sound and rustle of the bush surrounding you. While your guides are able to turn every tiny detail into an exciting discovery - from the dried bone of a longabandoned kill, to the sound of a cricket calling its mate, there is nothing that can compare to the thrill of looking up at an elephant or giraffe from ground level. It is true that encountering big cat predators on foot is typically rare, just knowing they are around is magical enough.




You do not need to be an ultra-athlete to take part in a walking safari, although a basic level of fitness is recommended – most days average around 10kms with plenty of time for tea and lunch breaks. Choose from day walks from a luxury tented or bush camp, or for the more adventurous, venture out and spend a number of days walking the wilderness between mobile camps. Enjoy learning bush survival skills with guides that bring every little thing to life, or spend your nights out in the wilderness in a star bed with nothing between you and a cornucopia of stars.

This is the closest you will get to authentic Africa: you will be completely immersed in her. To walk in Africa is to be part of Africa.



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
